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


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

Senior Play ...




In March, an all day conference was held in conjunction with the Buffalo chapters at which Miss Chen Laug Chi of China spoke on "The Road Ahead."








Tennis


Although interscholastic sports are heartily encouraged, intramural athletics, with their opportunities for reaching a much larger group of students, play an equally important part in the program of high school sports.


Intramural Basketball . . .




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
