Mr. Freeman's Twenty-fifth Year

On the occasion of his anniversary of twenty-five years of service with the Kenmore schools, Mr. Roy G. Freeman, Mrs. Freeman, and Richard Freeman receive a "Kenitorial" photographer into their home.



WENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO Mr. Roy G. Freeman came to the Kenmore school system as a regular teacher. Our principal then constitued the math and science departments in the Washington school. That was in 1918 and then there were approximately only sixty students registered in the four-year high school. Compare this with our present 1250 registration on a three-year basis. Among others, he taught Mr. George Dobson and Major Victor Owen, present members of the Kenmore High School faculty, the last of whom is now in the armed forces. He remembers also many others faculty members who went through the Kenmore system, but whom he didn't actually teach. It was in the present junior high school building in 1924 that Mr. Freeman became the principal of the high school.


Over the years he has seen many changes. These changes he notices particularly among the students. According to Mr. Freeman, the students today have much more poise, self-assurance, and confidence than students used to have. The only preference he has for the 'old days' is the smaller school. 'In a group as large as ours has grown to be,' Mr. Freeman said, 'a principal only comes in contact with a very small part of the entire group. In a smaller school a principal knows almost every student.'

"The Kenitorial," on behalf of the student body and the faculty, wishes to extend to Mr. Freeman its congratulations on this, his twenty-fifth anniversary of being with the Kenmore schools, and its sincerest hope that this is merely the first of many anniversaries.



The Royal Egyptian Royal Academy of Old Studies 84 Pharaoh Boulevard Cairo, Egypt

Dear Sirs:

Your recent letter of July 8, 2081 has just now come into my hands. The letter is about two years old. Consequently, I shall refresh your memory by telling you what you wrote. Your "Academy of Old Studies," it seems, is interested in compiling a list of outstanding men and women who were not Egyptians. At least, it was interested two years ago. Nevertheless, you could not have come to a better place for there are no Egyptians among that class of people here in Kenmore known as "successful." As a matter of fact, we don't even KNOW any Egyptians. Perhaps we aren't living well rounded lives.

It was in 1953 that Kenmore really developed into the giant city that it is today, and the sudden growth has been accredited to an amazingly talented group of young people who, strangely enough, all graduated from the old Highland Avenue Kenmore High School in the same year, which was 1943. The first move in the rebuilding of the then tiny village came in the spring of 1953 when Fred Weller, a brilliant young lawyer of the times (he was but 27), addressed the masses in the auditorium of the old senior high school on Highland Parkway. Weller's sincerity convinced the folks that Kenmore was at a definite disadvantage in being smaller than near-by Buffalo. He outlined a plan for bringing Niagara Falls to Kenmore, but the idea was proved to be impractical by James Boyle. Boyle's firm stand was followed by Avery Smith's motion that the meeting be adjourned. The motion was seconded by Jim Gillen, thus closing the most revolutionary meeting ever held in the small town. Refreshments were served by Connie Foley, Charlotte Anderson, Jane Thomas and Betty Ignaz, all under the supervision of Fay Tracey.

Following the meeting with fast action, Roger Moore, Olympic star, rallied the people behind him, and in a week Kenmore had grown to twice its original size. And do you know why? I thought not! The reason was that Moore had picked the best men in each field to help improve Kenmore. A mild mannered engineer, Walter Voisinet, had planned every move in the construction of the glorious new buildings, and the materials for these buildings were all spectacular new plastics created by the brilliant non-Egyptian research chemist, Robert Rustay.

During this busy week, Weller himself had not been sleeping. He had conferred secretly with General Johnny Snyder and Admiral Chuck Dobony, and details were worked out for an invasion of the rival city, Buffalo. Admiral Dobony in only three days was in control of all five of the Great Lakes. Then General Snyder captured Buffalo in no time at all and went on from there to play a season as "Mac" in MACBETH.

Medium sized Kenmore grew in still other ways. Enterprising business men and financiers made Kenmore a center of wealth and power. Daring, sharp as a needle, Dennis McCoskrie played havoc with Wall Street to such an extent that every man in the Stock Exchange trembled at the sound of his crisp thousand dollar bills. Under McCoskrie's insistent demands, Wall Street was extended to go through Kenmore, in order that Dennis might have a shorter walk to his office. Our museum has an exhibit of autographed I. O. U.'s presented by this famous Kenmore graduate. Also in the museum are three two-hundred-mile-an-hour locomotives (now obsolete) that were used by Commodore Austin Bush, the shrewd developer of the American Central Railroad system, the only railroad now operating in the United States.

Also in 1953, Jim Babcock bought the Columbus Red Birds, baseball team of the American Association. This gave him the expensive distinction of owning every baseball team in the country. Possibly more outstanding is the fact that John Christie managed them all, while his brother. Archie Christie, played on all of them.

Kenmore was not at a standstill politically either. Jim Biggie served six terms as President of the United States, during which time he crusaded for student control of teachers and all-day assemblies. Meanwhile, Pat Enright was Secretary of State, performing with all the ability of John Quincy Adams or Cordell Hull. Pat gave up an enviable position in the advertising game to help her country. Miss Enright proved that her political science course in college was no mistake.

Prophecy

In 1955, even more of these 1943 graduates became prominent. This time it was in the fields of science, medicine, and sports. Bill Jacobs blasted old, outdated ideas on psychiatry and set himself up in a profitable practice, helping such tired business men as Jack Zimmerman, Donald Dohn and James Kaiser to carry on with as much energy as ever in their respective enterprises. In later years, Jacobs kept many English teachers from insanity, a feat never before accomplished. Robert Bodkin, a rival psychiatrist, did the same thing for English students. Bodkin also played the plano. Late in the summer of 1955, Marian Layer won the Nobel prize for nursing. At about that time, Bob Johnston, Ted Powell, and Del Baskin made synthetic air for synthetic rubber tires. Their contribution supplied the missing punch to the automobile industry, which shortly before had come under the control of Jim Folsom. Folsom's boyhood pall Irving Haag, was out in Hollywood starring in a romantic film with glamour girls, Marge Yocum, Beverly Young, and Helen Doelman. Athletically, Spencer Nease's Baseball School was turning out the very best in future professional ball players and Dick Amsden was capturing speed skating championships from coast to coast. Kenmore's fame, together with the fame of its builders and townspeople, was echoed around the world by the potent news syndicate energetically headed by June Shaw and Ruth Murphy. One of their best circulation stunts was to have Walter Bickerton sitting on the flagpole of the Kenmore Hotel Statler, reading a copy of the girls' local paper, "The Kenmore Dependent Record."

Even in radio, Kenmorites made headlines. Helen Sleeper, encouraged by her success in "You Can't Take It With You," became the star of the dramatic production, "Third Husband," taking up right where Helen Menoken (who was not from Kenmore) left off. Vivian Green, Helen's girlhood chum, was doing the lead in "How Green Was My Valley," which had been broken down into serial form. A strictly novel touch, even for radio, was that President Jim Biggie sang during his fireside chats. On the fourth floor of the museum, under a protective coating of dust, is the famous eighty-foot dory used by Bill McQuillin, Ronny Jones, and Norris MacDowell, those gallant adventurers who sailed to India in search of rare perfumes for the Enchantment Cosmetics Company founded by Shirley Farr. She was the only woman member of the National Capitalists' Union. The union was a brain child of the economic expert, Paul Cramton. Paul figured it was time for the capitalists to get a chance at collective bargaining.

Every morsel of food consumed by our mighty little town was through the courtesy of the scientific agricultural wizard, Gordon Inskip, who owned and operated three whole states for the sole purpose of raising field after field of bright, green vitamins.

Surely the people of Egypt, the land of Cleopatra, remember the American Good Will Ambassadors to Egypt, Dorothy Maxwell, Jacklyn Knibloe, and Betty Domedion. Who could forget them?

The members of the Academy of Old Studies may be well impressed with the outstanding people of the Kenmore High School Class of 1943. Their influence has been felt throughout the world during the past century or so, but the most influential of all, was dentist Jim Weig who had more pull than anybody. Sports fans remember him as the young man who, at the age of seventy, swam the Atlantic Ocean — and on a stormy night, too! Of course, he was convoyed by Commander Lionel Noel and his submarine fleet.

Well, academy members, there is the whole story. I hope this report on outstanding people in Kenmore (who were not Egyptians) will help you in getting together a halfway decent chart of statistics on your project. Further data on the group may be found in the 1943 KENITORIAL, of which we have the only remaining copy. It is valued at \$50,000. We'll gladly lend it to you.

If I have been a little late in answering your letter I apologize, but you must remember that I am very busy keeping things in order around the museum.




